



In 1848, Wisconsin became the 30th state in the Union. As population grew along the more inhabited border towns along rivers, bays and lakes, the state looked to connect the more desolate lands between, offering federal land grants to help pay for construction on a system of railroad lines.

After the Wisconsin Central Railroad was selected to construct a railroad from Portage to Lake Superior, they entered the Northwoods of Wisconsin, lands rich in hardwoods and pine.

They called upon Louis Rivers, a French Canadian pioneer who had settled in Necedah, to set up a hotel at a specific supply depot location.

Drawn by the promise of free land and guaranteed business traffic, Louis and his brother, Frank constructed a log building on what is now the Northeast corner of North Chestnut Avenue and West Depot Street. The building became home to a hotel, store and tavern to service the railroad laborers, pioneers and travelers coming through the area.



The first train arrived in Marshfield in July 1872 and along with it came settlers. Growth was slow, however, until the arrival of William H. Upham. After establishing a saw mill and general store, Upham expanded into processing lumber

and the city began to see steady growth.

Marshfield continued to see commercial, industrial and residential growth until June 1887, when sparks from a switch engine set the lumberyard of the Upham Mill ablaze.

Dry conditions, fueled by strong winds, created an uncontrollable fire and by evening approximately 250 buildings and the Upham Manufacturing Company were gone.

As Marshfield's largest employer, the city looked to the manufacturing company for direction. That leadership came promptly at 6 a.m. the following morning as Hans Bille, under



the direction of Major William H. Upham, stood before the Upham flagpole.

Each pull of the halyard was a symbol of strength and determination. He would rebuild and

sustain the growing city of Marshfield.


A new city of fireproof stone and brick quickly rose from the ashes, and Marshfield soon became the center of multiple train routes and industries, earning it a designation as the "Hub

Marshfield has remained a hub of activity, while growing in size and scope. The city's downtown has remained vibrant, while hanging onto the old-time charm of the past.

The year 2022 marks 150 years for the long time hub, which is now situated at the intersection of multiple state highways.

The North Wood County Historical Society (NWCHS.) Marshfield Historic Preservation Association, Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce & Industry, Visit Marshfield,


and other individuals and organizations have collaborated on a year-long celebration to mark Marshfield's sesquicentennial.



Activities include trivia, interactive games, reenactments, recognitions, and activities which coincide with the city's annual events throughout the year.

For more information on activities and events, visit the yellow "mini-house" in front of the Upham Mansion at 212 W. Third Street, on the west side of Marshfield or the blue "minihouse" at the corner of Eighth Street and South Washington Avenue, in front of the historic home at 615 S. Marshfield Clinic : Then

The first Marshfield Clinic building at 650 S. Central Avenue was built just ten years after the clinic was formed by six local physicians. Continued growth necessitated expansion at this downtown site through 1970, when facilities were located to property adjacent to the St. Joseph's Hospital.

Marshfield Medical Center: Now

Marshfield offers world-class healthcare at the Marshfield Medical Center and strives to take care of its visitors while providing an exceptional experience at their state-of-the art facility.

Parkin Place : Then

Built in 1941 by a prominent Marshfield family as a dairy processing plant, Parkin Place served Marshfield



until the family business was sold in 1966. The organization that John Parkin helped to start is the same organization that, today, brings us the famous "Got Milk?" campaign and other promotional efforts. Parkin Dairy was noted for the elegant, molded ice cream desserts that were made to order and featured regularly at parties and dinners around Marshfield.

Blue Heron Brewpub: Now

Blue Heron BrewPub located in the historic Parkin Place building. The brewpub is located on the main floor, with a special events venue upstairs. The brewery is a 7-barrel system that produces their flagship brands, Honey

Blonde, Tiger's Eye, and Loch Ness Scotch Ale, along with many other seasonal and specialty brews. With constantly rotating taps, you're sure to find something new and uniquely Marshfield.



Soo Line Train Depot: Then

This Wisconsin Central Railroad Depot building was built in 1910 to replace the original wooden depot that burned to the ground on June 16, 1907. As the first train to service Marshfield, it contributed to Marshfield's reputation as "Hub City." It is generally now referred to as the Soo Line Train Depot.



Royal Tokyo: Now

Located in the historic Soo Line train station in downtown Marshfield, Royal Tokyo is a hot spot for celebrating special occasions. Their mouth-watering dishes are prepared right in front of you, serving hibachi-style teppanyaki steaks and seafood. Enjoy maki sushi rolls, gyoza, tempura, and soft-shell crab.

Soo Line Steam Locomotive

Locomotives erupted onto the American landscape in the late 18th and early 19th century. The Wisconsin Central Railroad built the majority of track in Wisconsin that connected the surrounding states and Canada. In 1911 the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault St. Marie (Soo Line) purchased a new American Locomotive Company Steam Locomotive to be operated by the Wisconsin Central Railroad. The Steam Locomotive 2442 was one of 15 class F-22 heavy freight locomotives built in New York that generated 43,000 pounds of haul power.

Fully loaded with coal and water the Locomotive weighed approximately 349,600 pounds. While attached to the tender (coal-car), the whole Locomotive measures approximately 67 feet. The 2442 Steam Locomotive's final run occurred out of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, in 1953 and sat until 1956 when it was selected to be relocated to its current site in the City of Marshfield. The locomotive does not include its original tender, but that of the identical Locomotive, 2441

Soo Line workers donated their time and effort to lay the track where the 2442 Steam Locomotive sits today. The Soo Line Steam Locomotive





2442 is the only remaining example of the Class F-22 operated by Wisconsin Central and Soo Line Railroad Companies.

Restoration occurred on the Locomotive in 1996 by the Marshfield Historic Preservation Association that included painting and buffing. The locomotive now sits underneath a roofed enclosure surrounded by a tall chain link fence at Wildwood Park.

Hefko Pool : Then

The pool was built in the 1930s and the adjacent bathhouse was added in the 1970s with only one amenity, a diving board. Commissioned by Mayor Ted Hefko during the height of the Great Depression years, Hefko obtained funds through the Federal Government's WPA program to construct a much-needed swimming pool in Marshfield.

Vandehey Waters Outdoor Aquatic Center: Now

Built on the same site as the previous Hefko Pool, the new Vandehey Waters Outdoor Aquatic Center offers the next generation new experiences of summer fun. The state-of-the-art outdoor complex features recreational elements for kids of all ages: multiple water slides, a climbing wall, a current channel and a lap and recreation pool for a full day of fun in the water. Back on land, you can also enjoy a game of cornhole and ping pong and eat a snack or two at the full concession stand. You'll also find convenient family changing rooms with private changing stalls and have access to a reservable shelter, party room, a grass area, and plenty of lounge chairs.

Marshfield's First Hotel: Then

Marshfield's first hotel, log cabinstyle, was built by Louis Rivers, his brother Frank, and G.A. Lupient. It was Marshfield's first permanent structure after their arrival here on April 1, 1872.

Marshfield's Newest Hotel Hampton Inn & Suites: Now

Conveniently located near Marshfield Medical Center at 400 W. Upham Street, the Hampton Inn & Suites is the newest addition to the Marshfield lodging scene. 



Marshfield Community Bikeshare

The Marshfield Community Bikeshare has been reimagined with help from Wood County and many partners. Starting out as a free bike check out program at local hotels, it has expanded to four community locations featuring 20 cruiser-style bikes that can be checked out via app for a rate of \$1/hour at four different locations throughout Marshfield (make sure to bring your helmet!).

This new expansion was modeled after the River Riders Bike Share program, which originally began in Wisconsin Rapids in 2014. It was created with the goal to bring additional transportation and recreation options to all of Wood County. Last year, thanks to local community support and sponsors, this program continues to achieve that goal by growing into the city of Marshfield.

Bikes Available at These 4 Locations:

- · Wildwood Park & Zoo
- Everett Roehl Marshfield Public Library
- Marshfield Clinic Health System YMCA
- Marshfield Fairgrounds

*The program is seasonal, and the locations can and do change based on demand

How to Use The Bikeshare:

The bike share program is an app-based program. Start by downloading the Koloni App (available on Android and Apple stores). It is free to download and sign-up. Create your own user account by following in-app instructions.

Once your account is set up, follow in-app instructions to unlock a bike. Scan the QR code on the bike itself or input the bike ID number also located on the bike. Once your bike is unlocked, enjoy your ride.

When finished with your ride, bring the bike to one of the four Marshfield locations, and follow the instructions on how to end your ride with the app and lock your bike back up. You will get a referral code after you finish your ride, and you can share it with others to earn free rides for the future.

CUBS TO BEARS



Bear-ginnings

In October 2015, the Wildwood Zoo welcomed Munsey & Boda, twin Kodiak bear cubs from Alaska. However, their story started five months earlier, when the cubs' mother was illegally shot and killed by an unguided hunter. Although brown bear hunting in Kodiak is open through mid-May, it's never legal to kill a sow with cubs. At 4 months old, brown bear cubs are almost entirely dependent on their mother for food and protection, and sadly, only about half make it to adulthood.

With the sow dead, the Kodiak cubs had almost no chance of survival in the wild. Luckily Tim, a guide from the Munsey's Bear Camp, which provides familyfriendly bear viewing and photographic experiences, had been watching them with a spotting scope. After discovering their mother had been shot, Mike Munsey contacted the Alaska Department of Fish & Game and was authorized to rescue the cubs.

Tim, along with Brandon and Harry, brought the cubs back to one of Munsey's cabins, where they stayed overnight until biologist Nate Svoboda could reach them the following day. Svoboda found the cubs hiding under a bed in the cabin, exhausted and frightened, and accompanied them to the Alaska Zoo, where they were fed, cared for and nursed back to health.



Happy Homecoming

As one of the fortunate few zoos in the "lower 48" to be an adopted home to the Kodiak bear, Wildwood Zoo focused on creating an environment for the bears that rivals exhibits in much larger cities, such as San Diego or Milwaukee, using bridges to connect habitats in a unique new design. Near the main exhibit, a 15-foot-wide glass viewing window encourages up-close and personal bear encounters and provides shade and shelter for visitors.

After the JP Adler Kodiak Bear Exhibit was completed and Marshfield welcomed the 10- and 12-pound cubs to their new home, everyone in the community suggested names for them via a public survey. Over 2,500 votes were received, with the overwhelming majority choosing Munsey & Boda, honoring Mike Munsey, who was instrumental in rescuing the cubs, and Nate Svoboda, the wildlife biologist who nursed them back to health.





The Kodiak bears will be turning 7 years old in 2022 and weigh just over 1,000 pounds, but still act like "toddlers" as they love to play and show off for their guests. Some of their favorite toys include a fire hose and empty beer keg to float in their pond. Marshfield is proud to host these massively charming bears and look forward to seeing them grow in years to come!





IT THE TRAILS

WILDWOOD CONNECTOR TRAIL (1)

The Wildwood Connector Trail (seen in yellow on the map to the right) is the newest addition to Marshfield's impressive biking and walking trail system. The 2.5 mile long asphalt trail, located between 17th Street and McMillan, is both on-road and off-road.

MCMILLAN MARSH WILDLIFE AREA

715-457-6771 O meadwildlife.org McMillan Marsh Wildlife Area is a diverse landscape of wetlands, woodlands, and grasslands. The area is approximately 6,500 acres in size and is located one mile north of the city limits of Marshfield. The property is open to hunting and trapping during the regular seasons, except for designated refuge areas. A seasonal 6.25 mile bicycle trail (combination of lime and gravel) is open May 1-September 1.


MILL CREEK TRAIL 3

Located on the south side of Marshfield in the Mill Creek Business Park, Preferred access to the trail is at 29th Street and Apple Avenue, but you can also access the business park from Cherry Avenue, Commerce Drive, and Hwy 10. The trail is 10' wide asphalt surface, and is approximately 2.6 miles long.

HAMUS NATURE PRESERVE TRAIL 4

Located at 210 Wilderness View Drive, it includes one mile of asphalt trails and over 1.5 miles of natural surface trails, with a small pond in the area.


Located at the intersection of Lincoln Avenue and 11th Street near Washington Elementary School, this trail connects to the UW Arboretum Trail.

Wood County & Power Pac Continue Support of **UTV Route Growth Amid** Industry Boom /////

Amidst a global pandemic leaving folks looking for an escape, and "Instagram syndrome" where capturing adventurous, beautiful photos is king, outdoor industries have grown exponentially in the last year. Already on the rise pre-pandemic, UTV and ATV trail riding has become one of the hottest outdoor trends. And, to the benefit of local economies, Wood County continues to cater to the pastime's growth in Central Wisconsin.

WHAT'S NEW: In early 2022, Wood County will open all county highways to UTV and ATV use unless a township states otherwise. This is a huge step and comes on the heels of two very productive years of opening routes for the county. Nearly 75 miles of new UTV/ATV routes were opened since 2019 in addition to new ATV/ UTV campsites in Pittsville's Dexter Park and more than \$400,000 in grants that funded route and trail maintenance. In addition to Wood County's efforts, Mandy and Josh Witt, owners of Power Pac, worked with local townships to open additional routes in the towns of Lincoln and Cameron and is in talks with the city of

Marshfield to identify a few potential routes that may make sense to open within the city to connect route users to local businesses.

"The new routes and discussions demonstrate Wood County's commitment to growing off-road tourism," says Jake Hahn, Chairman, Highway, Infrastructure and Recreation Committee. "Neighboring counties are generating a lot of tourism with ATV/UTV routes. Jackson County generates \$12 million dollars of economic activity with their route and trail system. That's the kind of shot in the arm that will allow local bars and restaurants to keep their doors open. We can't afford not to do it."

The new Wood County routes were strategically designed to connect to existing mainline routes and trails, thereby linking to adjacent counties. The goal: bring new visitors and dollars through the area.

"A new study from the Wood County Planning and Zoning Department estimated the economic impact of county UTV/ATV trails



and routes to be around \$1500 per visiting rider," says Matt McLean, Director, Marshfield Convention & Visitors Bureau. "Not only are these developments a great asset for riders, but they will invigorate local businesses by increasing traffic from an under-tapped group of visitors and consumers."

A 2011 case study of the Cheese County Trail in southern Wisconsin found that the total combined spending of all trail users exceeded \$15 million during the 12-month study. 86% of that amount was from non-local trail users.

"These aren't small numbers," says Mandy Witt, co-owner and CMO, Power Pac. "This type of tourism will do real things for our local economy and Central Wisconsin can no longer be seen as a 'drive through' area on the way to the Northwoods. We applaud Wood County and local townships for seeing this vision and we'll continue to do everything we can to assist in this strategic growth for our local communities."







GET WET, GET WILD & DON'T FORGET THE ICE CREAM

Marshfield is a great destination for a family getaway. If you're pressed for time, a day trip to while away the lazy hours of summer are a great way to make memories with your budget in mind. But where to begin? Would you guess Marshfield's south side? Fear not families - it's time to banish the "I'm bored-s" with some sight-seeing, splish-splashing, and satisfying sweet cravings with the whole family.



Stop #1: Get Wild

Start your day at Wildwood Zoo (608 W. 17th Street), where you'll see animal species found throughout North America, including the zoo's most iconic - twin Kodiak bears Munsey and Boda. See them up close in their 15-foot viewing window (where you'll also find cool Kodiak bear facts and shade). Often, if it's a hot day, the zookeeper will treat them to an icy delight which is fun to watch the bears lick, eat, and demolish with their massive paws. If the bear brothers have wandered across their covered bridge into the enrichment grounds of Bear Woods, you may get the joy of seeing them roam, wrestle, and play around in their favorite pond.

Make your way over to the Cougar Exhibit and Welcome Center and pay a



visit to Star and Thunder. From inside, use the large viewing windows to see the cougars interact with the zookeeper during feeding times. Kids also love the large, interactive water table they can manipulate to rain and learn the life cycle of water.



A separate, interactive, electric display also teaches kids about the scientific wonders of power. The Welcome Center is also home to small animal exhibits and conveniently adjoining restrooms.

Explore the outer zoo to see many more animals, including foxes, wolves, lynx, prairie dogs, and eagles (to name a few). The large animal exhibits can be seen by car or on foot. For a mid-morning break, you can follow the sidewalk path toward Wildwood Park and let the little ones burn off some energy at the playground.



Stop #2: Get Wet


The second the kiddos see the water slides, the decision has already been made, and it's a no-brainer. There's truly something for every member of the family to love at the new Vandehey Waters Outdoor Aquatic Center (1900 S. Central Avenue). Older kids will have a blast sliding down the water slides and braving the


diving board and climbing wall. Parents will love floating around the current channel and the option of keeping an eye on little ones playing in the splash area from the comfort of a nearby lounge chair. Back on land, you can also play a game of cornhole, get your snack on at the concession stand, and play yard games in the grassy area. With convenient family changing rooms, private changing stalls, and lockers (bring a lock) it'll be easy to keep everyone happy and organized whether you come for a quick dip or make the most of your afternoon. Stop #3: Don't Forget the Ice Cream

After a great afternoon at the aquatic center, you should still treat yourself with a stop at one of Marshfield's dairy-favorites: Hub City Ice Cream Company (1610 S. Central Avenue). Located just a few blocks away from the pool (a very walkable distance via sidewalk, if you choose), you'll find friendly staff scooping up 24 flavors of premium Chocolate Shoppe ice cream. Kids of all ages can taste-test flavors and choose their favorite ice cream container: sugar cones, dishes, or homemade waffle cones, which are made fresh daily. The rich and creamy ice cream is worth the trip alone and the variety is delightful! If you're looking for a confection beyond the case, give their sundaes, floats, shakes, malts, and slushies a try! We recommend you take advantage of their outdoor patio, where you can soak up the sun (or enjoy a sunset) as you savor your ice cream.







Burgers and beer are a mainstay, Wisconsin tradition for a great reason - so many flavor combinations to try, and always served with care. What better time to gather with your friends and give them all a try? Bon appetit!






